#### **PNC (Pastor Nominating Committee) May Update**

The PNC continues to work hard to find our next pastor. Since the end of March, we have received 64 computer generated matches from the PCUSA computer database called the CLC. This system uses fixed data such as position, salary, location, and Leadership Competencies to make a match.

There are thirty-three Leadership Competencies to choose from. Both the PNC,s and the pastors each choose ten. The PNC picks the ten most important skills for the position while the pastors pick ten, they think they strongly process. The computer then sends a PNC a personal Information form for each pastor who matches the Leadership Competencies.

A few skills identified as important by the Bethany PNC are being an effective preacher/worship leader, someone who demonstrates integrity by walking the talk, and the ability to build solid relationships of trust and respect inside and outside the church.

Although right now the CLC is our primary source for candidates we are working to identify other avenues. We will be sure to keep you updated as things develop. But for now, with Gods guidance, we will continue to use the CLC to look for the perfect pastor for Bethany.


By replacing all or part of your lawn with native vegetation that provides food and cover, you can create a refuge to attract a variety of

wildlife. This not only will provide much-needed habitat, but it will also create an opportunity for you to see and learn about wildlife.

Although lawns can provide benefits, large expanses of lawn displace other diverse natural habitats that most wildlife species find appealing. The lawn, clipped short and consisting of very few species, is a rather hostile, sterile environment for most wildlife, being devoid of food and places to hide or nest. Planting and maintaining a lawn also has time, economic, and environmental costs.

As homeowners become aware of the costs of maintaining lawns, both to people and to wildlife, many are choosing to replace all or part of their lawns with more wildlife- and environment-friendly alternatives.




